PRIDE AND PROTEST: FRIDAYS IN JUNE AT CSZ By RABBI REUBEN ZELLMAN

What is Pride in a year like this?



In some ways, our queer and trans communities have more visibility and possibility than ever before. Simultaneously, our freedoms and values are now in grave danger from our own government. We may be furious, afraid, or grieving; we may feel motivated, numb, or prouder than ever; we may feel all of these, and more.

The last Shabbat of June has long been our Pride celebration. But with so much to think about – so much to feel about – we're expanding. This year, every Friday in June offers a different way to honor Pride, in person or online. May these bring us intellectual and moral challenge, Jewish wisdom and comfort, and queer creativity and joy.

June 6: Trans Celebration Shabbat, in loving memory of Ray K. Bernstein, z"l. Learn with visiting scholar Lior Gross, founder of the Nonbinary Hebrew Project! With 'male' and 'female' grammar only, what's a nonbinary Hebrew user to do? Lior will lead workshops on inclusive Hebrew grammar (5:30) and the history of this work (6:30). The 7:30 Shabbat service will be wildly trans, including a drash from Lior and nonbinary prayers.

June 13: Pride Yizkor. As Pride unfurls, many of us feel the absence of friends, partners, family and movement leaders who died of bigotry, AIDS, transphobia and more; and we remember the generations who fought for our freedoms. Pride Yizkor will be part memorial service, part queer history, part recommitment. 6:00 - 7:15 pm

June 20: Honoring Juneteenth. We reflect on Black history and our ongoing responsibility to fight racism. At 6 pm Deborah Levy and Larry Best will report on their Workers Circle trip to the South. At the 7:30 service the drash will be given by Ilana Kaufman, founder of the Jews of Color Initiative, which is dedicated to racial equity in the Jewish community.

June 27: Pride Shabbat At 5:45, join us outside the synagogue to cheer on the Trans March. This is the year to have our biggest crowd ever. The service starts at 7:30, with food and festivity both before and after. It's raucous and funny and really queer, even for us.

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SHAVUOT: A FESTIVAL OF JEWISH INCLUSIVENESS By RABBI O



Quick, what's your favorite Jewish holiday?


I don't know what holiday you listed, but I know which one you didn't: poor Shavuot gets no love. It's the pilgrimage festival that marks

the giving of our Torah, now commonly observed through all-night study sessions and midnight cheesecake tastings. But did you know that Shavuot also offers us some deeply radical, perhaps even subversive, ideas about knowledge and belonging?

First, the Torah was given to all of us – irrespective of age, gender, educational attainment, or citizenship status. In Deuteronomy, we read, "You are standing here today, all of you, in the presence of the

Eternal your God — your leaders and chief men, your elders and officials, every man of Israel, your children and your wives, and the immigrants living within your camps, from those who chop your wood to those who carry your water." The text doesn't obscure the inequality and class hierarchy found in every society. Instead, it affirms that Torah transcends those human categories.

The covenant extends beyond everyone who was physically present: "I am making this covenant, with its oath, not only with you who are standing here with us today in the presence of the Eternal our God but also with those who are not here today." The principle that "we all stood at Sinai" is the great equalizer. Whether we were born into the Jewish community or found our way in, these ancient words and timeless words belong to us all.

AN ENDOWMENT SECURING OUR FUTURE

In a topsy-turvy world, it is reassuring to know that Sha'ar Zahay has become more financially secure, thanks in part to generous SZniks over the years who have left bequests to our congregation. These bequests become part of SZ's Endowment Fund - a separate investment portfolio meant to ensure the long-term health of our community.

Each year, SZ's annual budget receives a portion of the revenue from the Endowment portfolio. In coming years, we anticipate that this will make up as much as 10% of our annual budget. A portion of the principal of the Endowment can also be tapped to pay for important capital expenses (for example, needed improvements to our building), if the Va'ad requests this and it is approved by the Endowment Board. Most of the principal, however, cannot be touched unless our community faces a financial threat to our existence, thus ensuring that the Endowment doesn't get depleted.

The Endowment Fund has its own Board, composed of the past five Presidents of the congregation. I am honored to serve, together with Deborah Levy, Marc Lipschutz, Nancy Levin and Laura Lowe. The San Francisco Jewish Community Federation oversees the investment of these funds. The Endowment Board is working to ensure that they are invested in ways that offer a strong financial return and are also aligned with our community's values.

We are deeply grateful to everyone who has supported Sha'ar Zahav through a legacy gift, including Sam Thal z"l, Ray Bernstein z"l, and many others. As you think about your own legacy, please consider helping to ensure our future by including Sha'ar Zahav in your plans. For more information, please contact Danny Shapiro, our Executive Director, or Alex Ingersoll, who will be overseeing our legacy awareness efforts going forward.

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COMMUNITY, COURAGE, AND **CONNECTION IN TROUBLED TIMES**

SHA'AR ZAHAV

In February and March 2025, Congregation Sha'ar Zahav hosted The Narrow Bridge: A Time of Perseverance, a series of seven gatherings offering emotional, spiritual and practical support in the wake of rising uncertainty under the newly-inaugurated administration. It was a space for reflection, healing, and resilience, guided by distinguished speakers.

We began with Public Lament led by Rabbi Mychal Copeland and Rabbi Reuben Zellman, engaging in Jewish rituals of grief and communal resistance. Therapist Karen Erlichman led Trauma and Transformation, addressing intersectional trauma and offering healing tools. Attorney and advocate Neil Grungras led Spectra of Political Freedoms, which explored lessons from those living under repressive regimes, and Does Emigration Make Sense for You?, offering guidance on relocation in response to rising threats. In Is California Truly a Sanctuary?, Supervisor Rafael Mandelman, Rabbi Eliana Kayelle, and State Senator Scott Wiener discussed California's role as a safe haven. The series also explored the Synergistic Effects of Queerphobia, Racism, and Antisemitism, with Beco Lichtman, Dr. Gregg Drinkwater, and Neil Grungras, followed by Rabbi Amy Eilberg's session on Mussar Practice in a Troubled Time, with spiritual tools for resilience.

The Narrow Bridge taught and reminded us that in difficult times, we draw strength and hope from our community. Community leaders noted that Sha'ar Zahav had yet again offered cutting-edge programming, speaking truth to adversity. We are grateful to all the speakers and participants whose wisdom and compassion will help us cross this bridge together.

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
